• Helping disabled veterans by requiring the Texas Residential Construction Commission to provide a list of builders that construct accessible housing and to encourage all builders to build accessible housing.

• Making state government more energy efficient by requiring state computers to use energy management software and requiring vending machines on state

Frances respects all faiths, and follows her path as a Christian. She understands the strength that faith brings to individuals and families in times of crisis and great personal challenge.
